LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design)

LEED certification provides a measurable guide to the environmental impact of a building based upon design, construction, and operation.

Furniture and materials are not certified under the LEED program. However, the use of environmentally friendly or low impact materials and furniture earns points towards a LEED certification.

3.3 Resource Reuse – 30% Furniture Furnishings

1 Point

Fact

HMU reuses approximately 85% of each panel, connector, overhead bin, and tackboard.

Commentary

Raw materials are extracted once but returned to the marketplace multiple times with a dramatically minimized manufacturing process.

3.3 Resource Reuse – 20% (post consumer + ½ pre-consumer)

1 Point

Fact

HMU has a variety of recycled fabrics to choose from.

Commentary

Interface Fabrics provides Terratec fabrics which are made from 100% recycled or compostable materials.

5.1 Regional Manufacturer – 20% Manufactured Regionally

1 Point

Fact

This point can be added if the HMU facility is within a 500 mile radius of the project.

4.2 Low-Emitting Materials: Paints and Coatings

1 Point

Fact

HMU utilizes a powder coat paint line that meets requirements for low VOC paint.

Commentary

Any parts requiring a wet paint application receive water-based paint.

6.1 Controllability of Systems: Lighting

1 Point

Fact

HMU's tasklighting contributes to the ability to adjust lighting to suit individual needs.

Commentary

Workstation tasklighting can be repositioned or simply by turning off if not needed.
